

Club Reports and Race Results

Kosciusko Alpine Club

The culmination of many years of anticipation was achieved during the last year in the completion of our Club Lodge at Charlotte's Pass.

Supported on granite foundations, which enclose a lower ground floor for use as a ski room, the timber-framed building contains two other floors, one almost entirely comprising a lounge room, the other containing twenty-two twin bedrooms, together with shower and toilet rooms.

The building was designed by Mr. Dudley Ward, an architect club member, who also supervised the erection, which was carried out by Messrs. Paterson Bros. Two large open fires maintain heating for the lounge room and also supply heat for a drying room, which is located on the same floor level as the bedrooms.

The cost of the building has been mainly financed by debentures, taken up by over 50 per cent. of club members. Although the cost of the building has considerably exceeded the original estimate, the club is now the proud owner of a lodge of sound structure and excellent appearance, which will continue to provide comfortable accommodation for many ensuing years. Club members receive priority of bookings, but after their requirements have been fulfilled, members of all other ski-ing clubs are given the opportunity of taking any remaining accommodation and it is very pleasing to report that many skiers were able to stay in the K.A.C. Lodge during the 1952 winter season, even though they were not K.A.C. members.

Faced with the difficulties of stocking the lodge for the 1952 winter season and knowing the problems of management, transport, bookings and other necessities for successful control, the club was very fortunate to have the full support of the N.S.W. Govt. Tourist Bureau in the serving of meals in the Chalet and also in the handling of bookings for skiers not members of K.A.C.

Membership of the club continues to grow and of our present membership of 421, we have over 250 active skiers.

White's River Hut, which is leased by the club during the winter season, was well patronised during 1952 and has proved to be of great value for Main Range touring parties.

Looking into the future and trying to forecast may be not altogether wise, but with the Lodge now a reality and with the continued support of our own members and skiers generally, we do not see any blizzards approaching which could mar the progress and activities of K.A.C.

Ski Club of Australia

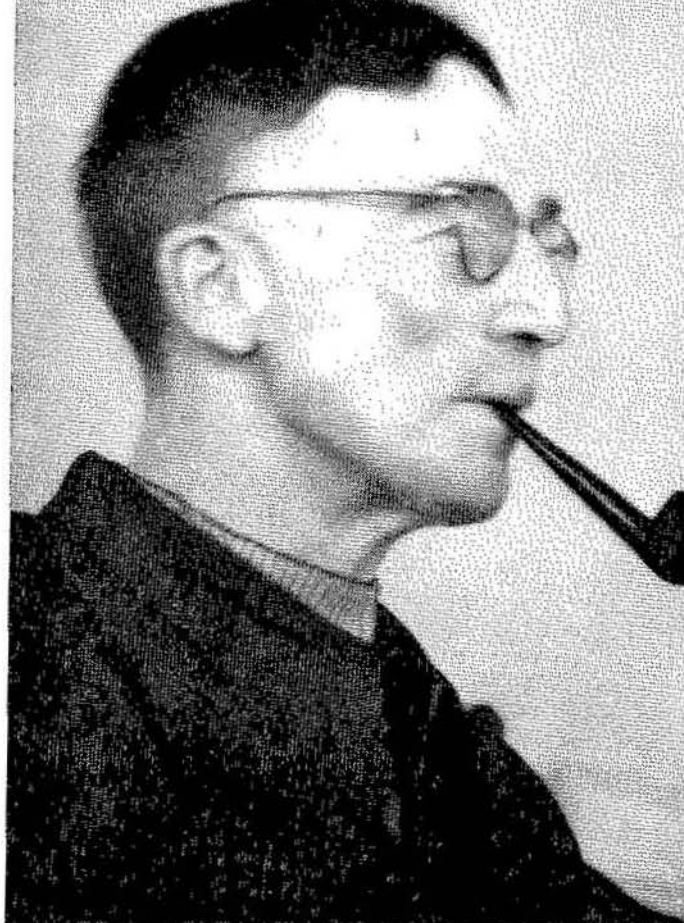

The Summit Ski Club

In 1927 Tour No. 13, mainly recruited from members of the Public Service and their friends, made a trip to Kosciusko. Many members of this tour, realising the advantages of club membership, decided to form a ski club. The club was formed and was known as the Public Service Ski Club and spent its official year on the snow.

The original Officers were: Mr. B. Carmichael, President; Mr. S. Hastings, Hon. Sec. & Treasurer; Mr. C. Smith, Captain.

The Club functioned as the P.S.S.C. with its official season on the snow during the last week in July and the first week in August until 1939 when, owing to the fact that very few if any Public Servants remained in the Club, it was decided to rename it the Summit Ski Club.

Annual racing programmes were held each year, consisting of four events. The winner having the best aggregate score from the four events was presented with a miniature replica of the club trophy which was unfortunately destroyed in the Hotel fire. The Club was also for a time the only one in N.S.W. to hold an open race.

During the war the organisation of the club was maintained and from 1946 has again been active on the snowfields.

On 29th October, 1952, the Club celebrated its 25th anniversary at a Dinner at the Pitt Club, followed by the 25th Annual General Meeting, where the usual business was carried out. It also adopted a revised constitution which covered the amendment of the club designation to THE SUMMIT SKI CLUB OF AUSTRALIA and at this meeting also the Club elected one of its original members, Mr. S. (Mick) Hastings, as an Hon. Life Member.

The celebrations were again carried on further when on 13th December, 1952, the Club held a cocktail party at the Feminist Club, a particularly gay and well attended function. The Club Patron, Mr L. E. Bowman, cut the huge birthday cake depicting a typical snow scene.

The objects of the clubs are the encouragement of good fellowship, the sport of skiing, social activities and provision of accommodation on the snowfields.

Sydney Ski Club

Members of the Sydney Ski Club had one of the most successful seasons on the snow in the Club's history. Although weather conditions were not ideal for the first week commencing 2nd August, Main Range skiing being very restricted, the snow around the Chalet Valley was excellent, and full use was made of the ski hoist.

Standard of skiing in the Club is very high, and it is hoped that several members will be participating in the New South Wales and Australian Championships this year.

The Club races, which were originally to be held on the Back Perisher, and postponed on three occasions because of poor visibility, were subsequently held—the Championship in two runs from Mt. Guthrie and Mt. Stillwell—the Slaloms from above Pulpit Rock, and the Langlauf a circuit around Trapyard, Spencers Creek and Guthrie.

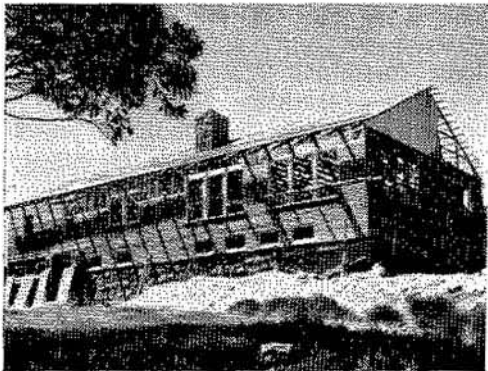

Kosciusko Snow Revellers' Club

The Snow Revellers' principal interest during the year just past was naturally centred around the building of the Club Lodge in the Perisher Range at Kosciusko.

The granite foundations, lower walls and chimney of the building were completed by the Kosciusko State Park Trust prior to Easter, 1952, a really excellent job being done by Messrs. Ray Ainsworth, Jack Piazza and their staff. The Club is very much indebted to them.

From this point, the work has been performed by voluntary labour from among the Club members. At Easter, despite wet miserable weather the timber frame walls were erected up to roof plate level. The early onset of winter prevented much further work and it was not until Christmas-New Year that major progress was realised. At the time of writing, the exterior walls and framing of interior partitions are completed, floor laid and the roof timbers are ready for attachment of tiles, which when completed will seal the building against the weather.

The Lodge is a two storey structure, 63 feet long and 30 feet wide with granite walls reaching 5 feet from the ground, timber framing covered by log cabin weatherboards of oiled cypress being used above the stonework. Accommodation comprises: 1st floor—four 2-bed cabins, one 6-bed dormitory and one 8-bed dormitory, a large dining and common room 26 feet long by 20 feet wide with stone fireplace, kitchen, lavatory block and staff room. The ground floor includes the main entrance, ski room and drying cupboards, pantry, laundry and storage space for wood fuel and kerosene. The lodge will

be centrally heated and provided with hot water service and all "mod cons."

The Building Committee, headed by Bob Gammie, is confident that the Lodge will be opened for the winter of next year, the realisation of the dreams of many Snow Revelers who have worked over the years on this scheme.

In the meantime, the temporary hut put up at the site at Christmas two years ago has proved invaluable. It has provided accommodation for the various parties of Club members working on the job, also for the State Park Trust employees erecting the stonework. In the two intervening winters, a large number of members have availed themselves of the excellent snow conditions which exist in the area (combined with the relatively easy access from Smiggins) by spending their winter holidays at the Hut. Most useful information has thus been obtained on problems of fuel, water supply, snow conditions, access, etc., which has been incorporated in the planning of the Lodge.

Membership stands at 426, which is the highest since the inception of the Club in 1932, and plans are being made to celebrate the "coming of age" this year in an appropriate manner.

The tour to the Chalet in September was well patronised by about 40 members. The weather during the first week was very kind, snow conditions being particularly good for early September, although the inactivity of the ski lift (despite members' efforts to dig it out) was disappointing.

The racing programme organised by Vice-President Norm Purnell and his Committee was started at the end of the first week, but this unfortunately coincided with the onset of really bad weather and the races were largely abandoned as conditions did not improve until the members were preparing to return to Sydney.

This report would be incomplete without reference to the many entertainments arranged by keen and hardworking members during the year, which have greatly contributed to the main objectives of the Club—the promotion of the sport of ski-ing and of good fellowship on and off the snow.

Cooma Ski Club

The Cooma Ski Club last year formed itself into a limited liability company and commenced building operations on a club chalet. This was a major change in the policy of the club and it is hoped will strengthen the club besides producing much needed accommodation. Following much discussion, a site for the hut was picked near the summit of the Front Perisher. In this region was excellent snow, good ski runs and a magnificent outlook. The club has, however, been faced with extremely difficult transport problems.

The hut is now nearing completion and should be in full use during the coming season. It is 50ft. x 28ft. and will comfortably accommodate 20 people. The club is fortunate in that no money has had to be borrowed for the building. Expenses were met by inviting foundation memberships at £25, and all building work has been voluntary. Club members may work out their foundation memberships by working 12 full days at the hut.

Foundation members have been limited to 125, though there is no limit on the number of ordinary members. The foundation members have certain booking priorities.

Southern Alps Ski Club

The Hotel Kosciusko was destroyed by fire at approximately 4 a.m. on the morning of 18th April, 1951.

This unfortunate happening was regretted by all skiers who had spent many happy days in the vicinity of the old "Pub."

The Hotel for 42 years had been the headquarters of many ski clubs, including our own, and the names of Lambie, Speet, Petersen, Collins, Harris and McClutchey will not be forgotten for a long time.

During 1951 the S.A.S.C. had its first official season at the Chalet, with some members billeted at Spencer's Creek and others at Bett's Camp.

Unfortunately for the Club, bad weather prevailed during the week and the annual races were cancelled due to a blizzard.

In 1952 The Southern Alps Ski Club held its races at Charlotte's Pass. The Ladies' Slalom was won by Mrs. Alice Ducjinski in the fast average time of two runs in 1:16.6 seconds.

The club extended its sympathy to Miss Gloria Tyson, who broke her leg whilst competing on the icy surface.

Dudley Abel won the Men's Slalom with the splendid average time of 1:06.1. As Alice is his sister he had to better her runs or forever hold his silence!

The Open Slalom was won by I. Karlsson, of Norway, with an average time of 57.9 seconds from George D erschuko (59.01 seconds).

Mr. Derschuko has received Club nomination to compete in the Australian Championships to be held this year.

During the summer months many social functions were held, including an exhibition of water skiing by the club captain, Alf Najar, an Xmas party at the home of Bruce McVicar, a send-off to Gordon Dunn at the Carl Thomas restaurant and a film evening, which proved to be a great success.

George Sperling, from the Kosciusko Alpine Club, in the company of the President, George Nicoll, and others spent a never to be forgotten week-end on the Main Range in the spring. Runs were made to the foot of Little Austria and from the top of Townsend via Lake Albina to the Chalet on consecutive days. En route Charles Anton was encountered surveying the Northcote Ski Lift.

THE big jump had been built less than one mile from Guthega camp on a hillside on Farm Creek and a tremendous amount of work had been done. At first sight it looked near enough to a 50 metre hill with a natural in run and all, but really it was not steep enough for such distances, which was shown when the winner, Mr. P. Botten, reached 41½ metres on his last jump.

As usual, the early spring snow created problems. The day opened up rather hot with a misty rain and in spite of energetic stamping it was decided to resort to artificial freezing on the out-run and very ingeniously some "weed killer", containing, I understand, nearly 100 per cent. sulphate of ammonia, was sprinkled all over the out-run where the anticipated landings would be made and within a few minutes the hill had frozen—perhaps even too much.

The day, as a whole, was a great credit to the organisation and I feel I must particularly stress our gratitude to the people in charge of transport and roads, headed by Mr. Sverre Lund-Larsen. Owing to continuous rain over the last few weeks, the roads had deteriorated tremendously all the way from the Island Bend turn-off on the main Kosciusko road and up to Guthega, a total distance of nearly 15 miles, but with bulldozers and graders, the 312 private vehicles (which turned up with close on 1500 spectators) managed to get through with a few mishaps.

A short Slalom course had been prepared adjacent to the big jump. This course was not set in any way to championship stan-

dard, but nevertheless it enabled a lot of skiers to show their skill, and at the same time acted as a guide to the Norwegians themselves to select their final team for the Australian Championships at Mount Buller.

Enthusiastic members from the Sydney Ski Club in residence at the Chalet also turned up and otherwise, skiers from Betts and other huts, including the newly erected Telemark Hut on the Perisher, arrived. I feel that a remark by a young Norwegian from the Guthega camp is indicative of the organisation, when he uttered, "How the devil can the kitchen cope with giving all these thousands of people lunch in our mess." Yet, it was actually a fact, everybody was well fed!
